

The Olweus Program (pronounced OI-VAY-us)

Description

The Olweus Program is a comprehensive approach that includes school wide, classroom, individual, and community components. The program is focused on creating a lasting safe and positive school climate in elementary, middle, junior high and high schools (K-12). The program aims to reduce and prevent bullying problems among schoolchildren and improve peer relations at school. The program has been found to reduce bullying among children, improve the social climate of classrooms, and reduce related antisocial behaviors, such as vandalism and truancy. The Olweus Program has been implemented in more than a dozen countries around the world and thousands of schools in the United States.
